#### **Department Summary:**

Parks and recreation facilities and the programs, activities, and services that occur within them, contribute greatly to the overall quality of life in Golden. The award-winning Golden Parks and Recreation Department is responsible for maintaining open spaces, for providing a quality system of parks and recreational facilities and for providing positive leisure opportunities for the community. Golden is home to many unique recreational amenities for a town of its size including 254 acres of parkland, 402 acres of open space, 25 miles of trails, 10,000 trees, Fossil Trace Golf Club, Splash Aquatic Park, Golden History Museums and the Golden Community Center. The Parks and Recreation Department includes the Municipal Facilities Division, Recreation Division, Parks, Forestry, and Cemetery Division, Golden Museums Division, Golf Maintenance Division and Golf Clubhouse Division.

#### Parks, Recreation and Museums Advisory Board

In order to increase community involvement, a Parks, Recreation and Museums Advisory Board (PRAM) was created in 1982. Board members are appointed by City Council and represent Golden citizens. PRAM consists of seven members and one alternate which serve four-year terms, makes suggestions about policies and procedures, fees and charges, acceptance of park land, design of parks, and other projects relating to the Parks and Recreation Department.

PRAM meets on the first and third Thursday evening of each month. The third Thursday is the regular meeting date. # Golden History Museum & Park Improvements

Golden History Museum & Park (GHM&P) made many facility and exhibit improvements in 2021. In the History Park, the 1870s Reynolds and Pearce cabins were reroofed with fire resistant cedar shakes. The previous roofs were installed when the cabins were located to the Park in the 1990s and were in poor condition. The work was completed by noted Colorado preservationist, William Granda, following the Secretary of Interior's Standards for Historic Preservation.

Two new interpretive exhibits were added in 2021 to help visitors to the GHM&P understand the region's rich agricultural heritage.

Heritage Apple Orchard: In collaboration with the City's Parks and Forestry Divisions, Golden History Museum planted a new apple orchard in front of the Guy Hill School House. The Parks department amended soils, installed drip irrigation, and planted the seedlings. GHM&P partnered with the Montezuma Orchard Restoration Project to select varieties of heirloom apples that were once common in the Golden area.

Ornamental Rose Garden: Near the Pearce Cabin in the center of the park, GHM&P installed an ornamental rose garden. The roses were moved from the GHM&P grounds and spent the winter at the Golden Cemetery while a new garden bed was constructed. Parks department staff provided irrigation and planted the roses, and the Golden Lions Club donated materials and built the picket fence. Both additions will help visitors

Finally, GHM&P added a new, expanded, and accessible creekside patio in 2021. The patio will allow for more outdoor, socially distanced gatherings. It also provides a grand new staircase to the museum entrance, as well as, an ADA accessible ramp.

# Clear Creek Ambassador Program

After years of continued growth in activity along the Clear Creek corridor, the City Manager created a working group comprised of a variety of stakeholders. They met regularly to discuss issues, challenges,

and potential strategies, to manage user impacts and improve overall conditions for outdoor enthusiasts. One strategy included an education campaign.

In May of 2021, Parks and Recreation staff were tasked with developing the Clear Creek Ambassador Program to better inform, educate, and establish new cultural norms around the Corridor. In late June, four ambassadors successfully carried out the mission to assist visitors with directions, information about Golden, creek education and friendly rule reminders. The four ambassadors worked Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays and stationed at the Billy Drew Bridge and beach area.

#### **OUTCOMES INCLUDED:**

- Coordinated efforts with park rangers on training and communication.
- Printed bilingual park rules rack cards.
- Collaborated with park rangers to provide friendly park rules enforcement.
- Promoted parks stewardship amongst trail users and tubers.
- Support the Parks Division on maintenance needs.
- Collaborated with the Golden Visitor's Center to promote City events and opportunities in the downtown area.

Ambassadors worked collaboratively with park rangers and the Golden Visitors Center. The program is expected to continue in 2022.



# Rebound of Recreation Through COVID

In 2021, the Recreation Division focused on pandemic recovery, with staff finding new ways of conducting business to attract a diverse community with different needs. While some programs and services were able to return to pre-pandemic operations, other areas were modified to address staffing shortages or work with public health compliance as it evolved. Some programs were noticeably impacted by change, such as aquatics, while other areas hit record high numbers, like golf.

Annual passes returned, providing convenience and savings for Golden Community Center (GCC) guests. For the first time, annual passes can be purchased online, expanding the use of technology to provide efficient access for guests and staff. With a change in public health requirements, reservations for weight room and gymnasium visits were removed and the hours of operation were expanded.

#### **Aquatics and The Splash**

While all divisions experienced seasonal staff recruitment challenges, swimming pool operations were impacted the most. Lifequard certifications, commonly obtained by teenagers, were challenging. The certification requires 29 hours of training. Full-time aquatics staff trained and hired more than 40 new lifeguards in advance of the summer 2021 season - nearly double a pre-pandemic year. Despite these recruiting efforts, only half of the lifeguarding positions required full summer operations at both the Splash and GCC were filled. Even though the Splash and GCC experienced staff shortages, Golden residents and visitors had swimming opportunities throughout the summer at both locations and exceeded safety standards. With many teenagers returning to their high school schedules in the fall, indoor swimming time remained restricted and included a reservation system. Swimming pool access continues to expand moving into 2022. The GCC resumed limited early morning lap swimming hours with the daily lap swim schedule. Water exercise classes were full and popular as ever, while private and semi-private swim lessons also returned.

#### **Golden Community Center Front Porch**

The reopening of the GCC's Front Porch was highly anticipated and once again offered a broad spectrum of opportunities in a safe environment for active adults. Mah Jongg lessons for beginners remained very popular, only limited by the number of students the volunteer instructor could teach. On any given day, the Front Porch saw individuals playing cards or billiards, enjoying coffee and conversation, working on jigsaw puzzles, meeting for book club, sewing and knitting, having monthly birthday celebrations and many other activities all in a Covid-safe environment. The Front Porch calendar was updated monthly and contained a full slate of classes and activities for active older adults. New programs will continue to be added regularly including group exercise classes, games, and enrichment programs. An updated calendar of activities can still be found in the Front Porch, the Golden *Informer*, GCC monthly e-newsletter, and online.

#### **Golden Community Center Licensed Child Care Program**

The Golden Community Center licensed child care programs expanded to provide additional quality child care opportunities to meet community need. Expansion efforts were supported with grant funds to help hire and retain quality instructors and purchase supplies.

#### **Popularity of Pickleball**

Pickleball remained as popular as ever with high demand for more space and time for the sport. The Department allocated resources and maneuvered public health orders to create additional indoor open pickleball during the winter of 2021 at the Tony Grampsas Gymnasium. This helped to satiate the need until spring weather provided outdoor opportunities for play once again. The Parks Division overlayed two additional courts at Lion's Park, totaling six outdoor courts. The Recreation Division hired a new part-time Pickleball Instructor and will offer beginner classes, boot camps and other programming to expand pickleball opportunities for residents and guests.

### A Peek into 2022 from the Parks Side

Big things started in 2021 for the City of Golden's Park system. Below are just a few teasers of what to expect in the coming year.

#### **DELONG GRAND OPENING**

After a delay in construction of DeLong Park in 2020, contractors broke ground in June 2021. As of November 2021, the Park was 85% complete. Due to supply chain issues, contractors are still waiting on the delivery of a few amenities. Once received, the installation process will begin and a grand opening is expect in the first half of 2022.

#### **OPEN SPACE MASTER PLAN KICK OFF**

Parks, Recreation and Museum's Advisory Board members and staff interviewed consulting firms and kicked off the project in September. Public meetings will occur in 2022. The final document will include the development of a definition of open space which will serve as the framework for making policy, administration, and management decisions.

#### **LUBAHN TRAIL PARTNERSHIP GRANT**

For several years the Parks, Recreation and Museum's Advisory Board has deliberated management and sustainability of the trail. In December, the Parks and Recreation Department was awarded \$87,500 through the Jefferson County Open Space Trails Partnership Grant to help fund improvements. The project will formalize and construction will begin in Q1 of 2022.







# 2021 Highlights RECREATION

- Incrementally expanded GCC programs and services throughout 2021 to return to pre-pandemic levels, including the return of Child Watch services and the Front Porch activities.
- **Removed reservation requirements** from general drop-in fitness and gymnasium use.
- Added an extra room for the Golden Community Center Preschool and increased capacity from 63 to 80 to offer expanded childcare opportunities.
- The GCC licensed child care program received a Child Care Relief Grant of \$14,850. The grant money is intended to offset operating expenses for the smaller group sizes, additional safety measures and disinfection supplies needed to operate during COVID.
- The GCC licensed child care program was awarded \$30,044 from the Emerging and Expanding Child Care Grant program. This funding supported expanded capacity during the pandemic, addressing quality child care shortages and was used to cover the cost of materials, supplies, professional development for educators and other program needs.
- Julie Adkins, Preschool Director, received the PLAY
   Professional of the Year award as voted on by her peers in
   the Colorado Parks & Recreation Association.

# 2021 Highlights **PARKS**

- Planted over 6,000 bulbs in downtown Golden and the parks.
- Enhanced Clear Creek corridor and addressed safety measures along the bank.
  - Stabilized the creek bank near the Clear Creek RV park
  - Addressed bank safety and kayak features near Parfet Park
  - Added a stone retaining wall along the Clear Creek RV Park on the south side, addressing safety concerns
  - Installed tuber access just west the 6th Ave pedestrian bridge
- Conducted Pride Days in the fall serving about 1,000 residents.
- Reduced all park irrigation water consumption by over 20%.

## **FORESTRY**

- Enhanced City tree canopy by planting 158 trees in 2021.
- Conducted significant tree hazard mitigation along street right of ways, parks and the Golden Cemetery.

# **CEMETERY**

- Experienced record-setting revenues. On track to outpace 2020, improving cost recovery.
- Conducted record number of burials (243 in) 2021.

# **GOLDEN HISTORY** MUSEUM & PARK

- Introduced **Autumn Fest** as a new family community event which drew approximately 1,800-2,000 guests with more than a dozen partners.
- Hosted the annual **Volunteer Appreciation Dinner** to celebrate 1,484 hours, representing \$42,354 of contributed **time** in 2021. (Current estimated national value of volunteer hourly wage is \$28.54 as calculated by <a href="IndependentSector.org">IndependentSector.org</a>)
- Began leading important new initiatives such as the **American** Indian Ethnography Project.
- Built and strengthened revenue sources; sought and obtained grant funds to offset losses due to COVID including:
  - Increased SCFD funding by nearly 100%
  - Awarded \$20,000 National Endowment for Humanities grant
  - Grant funds from SIPA (\$3,000), the Applewood Community Foundation, and Golden Civic Foundation

# 2021 Highlights **FOSSIL TRACE GOLF CLUB**

- Set new revenue records in green fees, carts, range, merchandise, and lessons are part of the COVID boom and aftermath as the country opened up.
- Experienced a wetter than normal spring which allowed staff to avoid significant irrigation cycles and promoted water conservation. Overall City water consumption was down by 8% while golf water consumption was down over 20%. As water supply is limited, this conservation was met with positive accolades within the City of Golden.

# **FACILITIES MAINTENANCE**

- Replaced all fluorescent light fixtures with LED's in City Hall, including Council Chambers, and the 1250 Jackson Street parking structure.
- Performed 1,912 total work orders in 2021.
- Performed major improvements and repairs at The Splash.
- Made improvements to the Clear Creek RV Park.
